Objectives and Methodology



Objectives

- Ipsos Reid was commissioned by the City of Kamloops to conduct a public opinion survey to assess residents' satisfaction levels, needs, priorities, and attitudes.
- The main objectives of this year's research were to:
 - Determine issues in need of attention from local leaders:
 - Assess residents' perceptions towards quality of life;
 - Understand residents' attitudes towards life in Kamloops;
 - Assess importance of and satisfaction with selected City services;
 - Determine perceptions of City communications, as well as communication and information needs:
 - Assess residents' preferred funding options;
 - Determine residents' priorities related to crime, the environment, and social planning; and,
 - Measure residents' physical activity levels and preferences, as well as determine awareness of the City's new active city initiative 'Kammotion'.





Methodology

- A total of 400 telephone interviews were conducted with City of Kamloops residents aged 19 or older.
- All interviews were conducted between May 3 and May 14, 2006.
- Overall results are accurate to within ±4.9%, 19 times out of 20. The margin of error will be larger for sample subgroups.
- Results have been weighted using the 2001 Census to ensure that the sample's age/gender distribution reflects that of the actual City of Kamloops population.
- Where appropriate, results have been benchmarked to previous City of Kamloops surveys and Ipsos Reid's Municipal Norms.
- A total of 81 interviews were completed as part of the non-random feedback mechanism (reported separately).







Key Findings



Key Findings

- Firstly, this research should be viewed in the context of a positive and satisfied populace.
 - Good quality of life
 - Satisfied with services
 - Positive impressions of Kamloops
 - Favourable impressions of City staff
- Not only are most residents highly satisfied with their quality of life, but there is also a sense it is improving.
 - Growth and development
- Impressions in many areas have improved since 2003.





Key Findings (cont'd)

- The top two issues on citizens' minds this year are taxation/municipal government spending and transportation.
- Drugs are a growing concern.
- When it comes to the delivery of services, the City of Kamloops has four primary strengths and three primary weaknesses.
 - Primary strengths: recreation facilities and programs, police services, waste collection services, road maintenance.
 - Primary weaknesses: communication between City Hall and residents, infrastructure improvements, recycling/composting services.
- Staff receive good marks for their performance, particularly when it comes to conduct and helpfulness.
 - However, satisfaction with contact experiences is declining.
- Most residents are willing to pay for recycling collection, but not collection of yard and garden waste.





Quality of Life

"How would you rate the overall quality of life in Kamloops today?"










The quality of life in Kamloops continues to remain high

"How would you rate the overall quality of life in Kamloops today?"





"And, do you feel that the quality of life in Kamloops in the past five years has ...?"








Growth is driving perceptions of an improved quality of life






City Services








Citizens are satisfied with all service areas



Satisfaction with police services and road maintenance has increased; however, there has been a drop in satisfaction with recycling/composting










All services achieve high importance ratings










The City has four primary strengths and three primary weaknesses










City Vision


City Contact and Communications

"Have you contacted or dealt with the City of Kamloops or one of its employees in the last 12 months?"





"The last time you contacted the City, was it ...?"








Reason for contacting the City vary

"What was the main reason why you contacted the City? Any other reasons?"









Contact experiences with the City are favourable

"Overall, how satisfied were you with that experience? Were you ...?"










Satisfaction with City contacts is on a downward trend

"Overall, how satisfied were you with that experience? Were you ...?"












Financing








Citizens would rather see the City obtain additional revenue from user fees than from increased property taxes

"Assuming the City needs to increase the amount of revenue it collects from citizens, would you prefer the City to ...?"










Safety and Security



"Would you say you generally feel more secure or less secure in your community than you did five years ago? Would that be a lot or somewhat more/less secure?"










The Environment








Most residents feel Kamloops has good air quality

"Overall, how would you rate the air quality in the City of Kamloops? Would you say that it is ...?"








The pulp mill is the main reason why some citizens rate the quality of air in Kamloops poorly

Yard and garden waste collection once every two weeks










Recreation and Fitness

"In a typical week, how many times do you engage in moderate physical activity or exercise for a period of 30 minutes or more?"








Walking is by far the most common form of physical activity or exercise

"What types of physical activity or exercise do you participate in on a regular basis? Anything else?"





"Have you heard of the City of Kamloops' new active city initiative called "Kammotion"?"








Most citizens see value in the City providing healthy living programs like 'Kammotion'


Social Planning

"And, which one of these social issues would you next most like to see the City of Kamloops take steps to actively address over the next few years?"








Residents would like to see local governments play a larger role in addressing social issues
