

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# Introduction

# Public Input Following Public Input Report 1

Public Input Report 1 detailed the results of 411 preliminary surveys completed by a combination of local producers, consumers, and food retailers from January to April 2012. The surveys and subsequent opportunities for public engagement were aimed at soliciting meaningful input from the public that could be considered in the development of an Agriculture Area Plan (AAP) for the City. 





# **Background Report and Historical Timeline**

# **Background Report**

It is important to fully research any municipal long-range planning topic prior to developing policy for it. Background reporting ensures a better understanding of the current and historical issues and provides a starting point for the general public in terms of providing meaningful input toward the development of policy based on all available information. A 90+ page background report with associated maps was developed and published for the AAP and made available via




the AAP website and in hard copy through the Development Services and Engineering Department. Information, including a summary of current issues and agricultural capability within the City, was used along with public input to support local agricultural policy development.

## **Historical Timeline**

An extensive historical timeline that details the agricultural history of Kamloops has been developed by City staff as a living document to provide insight into past local/regional agricultural successes and failures as well as trends and potential opportunities for moving forward with the industry.



The document is also intended to serve as a guide to new farmers interested in farming in the Kamloops region.

The timeline was advertised in the Kamloops Daily News and through a City media release in order to invite the public to send in their memories of local agricultural history.

At this time, the Museum and Heritage Commission have offered to move the project forward by conducting further research on agricultural history to add to the timeline and validate events and stories that are received from the public.

Historical events and memories continue to pour in from the public for this initiative.

# Farm Tour 2012

On September 13, 2012, the Kamloops Agriculture Advisory Committee hosted a full-day farm tour in order to facilitate a better understanding of the local commercial agriculture industry to help guide the development of a City Agriculture Area Plan.

The tour, with approximately 60 people representing various agencies, including, but not limited to, Interior Health, the First Nations Agricultural Association, the Ministry of Agriculture, Venture Kamloops, Community Futures, TNRD, City staff and Council, Thompson Rivers University and Agri-Foods and Olympic Legacies, aimed to educate participants on the challenges and opportunities of local commercial farming operations, trends of the industry, and the successes and failures of different sectors of Kamloops agriculture. The tour included presentations by Dhaliwal

Green Acres Vegetable Farm, Thistle Farm, Frolek Cattle Company, and Blackwell Dairy. Lunch was provided by Terra Restaurant, a Kamloops eatery that uses locally or regionally grown products as available, and funded by Community Futures Thompson Country.

Appendix 4 details the results of the Farm Tour.

# TRU Student Partnership

City staff solicited the support of Thompson Rivers University (TRU) students to add value to the AAP process through research and volunteerism and as an opportunity to raise awareness among young people about the issues facing the local agriculture industry. Three separate research projects were developed and presented by the students.

 Agri-Sciences Class (combination of first to fourth year students) instructed by Dr. Wendy Gardner, PhD, Assistant Professor, Natural Resource Sciences

#### Project Description:

Students, under direction from the AAP City Planner and Dr. Wendy Gardner, reviewed the local issues that were identified through the AAP process and worked toward identifying potential solutions to some of the higher priority issues. The chosen issues included environmental sustainability, urban agricultural interface, zoning and bylaws, and the lack of municipally-designated agricultural support.

Over the course of a semester, the students met with City staff and local producers and conducted research to develop posters that would identify potential strategies to better support the local agriculture sector and its growth. Some of the ideas identified included:

- The addition of a permanent Agriculture Advisory Committee;
- Endorsing less wasteful residential water use, thus allowing more water to be used for agricultural operations;
- Moving toward a more conservative and ultimately sustainable water system through education, encouragement and government policy; and
- Conducting a review and update of the Kamloops Zoning Bylaw.

Posters were publicly displayed on April 8, 2013, at TRU for the purpose of soliciting feedback from other students and the general public. Posters were also presented at the June AAC meeting for member review and consideration for the AAP.

#### Project Description:

Lack of Municipally Designated Agriculture Support, Specific to Kamloops, British Columbia and its Agriculture Area Plan: An Essay Submitted For NRSC 4230 in Partial Fulfilment of the Requirements for the Degree of Bachelor of Natural Resource Science

A City of Kamloops case study was conducted by Ms. Sparks in early 2013 regarding the process of developing the AAP. In collaboration with AAP staff and the AAC, Ms. Sparks chose to focus her fourth year graduating essay on one of the five priority issues identified by the AAC. A literature review of the potential solutions to support local agriculture and the subsequent pros and cons of each was first completed. Upon reviewing all options, Ms. Sparks recommended that the City of Kamloops implement an integrated approach that includes a permanent AAC and possibly a full-time position designated to agriculture support. She identified there would be an associated cost with these recommendations, but that the long-term benefits to local agriculture would be greater.

The results of Ms. Sparks' research are posted on the AAP website and were provided to the AAC for consideration in developing strategies and actions for the AAP.

 Directed Studies in Tourism: Tourism Destination Development Post-Baccalaureate, Supervised by Professor Robin Reid, Instructor, Tourism Management

#### Project Description:

Three students under the supervision of Professor Robin Reid decided to take a closer look at the meaning of agri-tourism as defined by the Agricultural Land Commission as well as associated opportunities that might exist to expand and promote the local agricultural industry. The intent of this undergraduate research project was to better understand the topic and provide the AAC with suggestions as far as what could be permitted on agricultural

land to increase awareness about local food, farmers and agriculture and provide farmers with a secondary source of income. The results of the study were presented to City staff, were made available to the AAC and posted on the AAP website.



# Community Roadshow and Exit Survey

City staff organized a community roadshow event from March 2013 until the end of April 2013 to present AAP progress, background information on the state of agriculture today, and the agricultural issues uncovered by the Agriculture Advisory Committee, consultants, and feedback from the community. The event was extended through mid-May due to community demand for these presentations.

The opportunity allowed individuals to comment on AAP progress to date, ask questions, and provide valuable feedback to be considered in the development of the AAP. In order to make public consultation convenient, staff presented to interested parties at their places of business or a location convenient for them. An exit survey was provided to all attendees upon completion of each presentation and a volunteer from TRU was present to take notes regarding any verbal comments, suggestions, and questions.

The road show opportunity was advertised in the Kamloops Daily News, at a City Council meeting via the stakeholder email group, on the AAP Facebook page, and on the AAP website. In addition, approximately 150 targeted emails were sent to neighbourhood associations, local agricultural organizations, local non-profits, government agencies and other local groups. Several TNRD producers attended presentations in hopes that the project might incorporate a regional perspective. While policies developed will be specific to the City of Kamloops, input from regional producers was welcomed and was considered for its applicability for local policies. Regional input is also shared with a TNRD Planner on the Kamloops AAC as it is received.

The following is the list of 23 presentations executed in the community as a result of community interest. Presentations lasted from 15-90 minutes, depending on the group's preference.

In addition to the scheduled presentations, a standardized version of the roadshow presentation and all other materials associated with the roadshow were available on the AAP website. This provided an opportunity for those that may not have been able to attend a presentation to view and comment via the online option.

A copy of the standardized AAP Roadshow presentation is attached as Appendix 5.

## We Listened and We Heard

Overall, the results of the roadshow identified a local interest in sustainable food and agriculture with a great deal of positive feedback. Participants commonly stated that they were glad the City was finally taking a step in the direction of supporting local producers and agriculture more generally. Some were skeptical as to what changes the City would be able to make to help grow the local agricultural economy, while others applauded the City for efforts toward the AAP.

The following is a randomized list of comments and notes recorded from the roadshow presentations:

- "Local regulatory process for having a second dwelling for the farm is too restrictive and intense when the ALC allows second dwellings by right provided certain criteria are met. Kamloops should implement regulations for second dwellings similar to those recently passed by the TNRD"
- "Many people are claiming farm status with BC Assessment but are not actively farming. BC Assessment is not tough enough"



- "Need to support local active farming operations without support those that are just looking for a way to make money on their non-active farmland (those that are not interested in farming but want the large parcel and the tax incentives that come with farmland)"
- "When is the City going to come around to allow us to have urban/backyard chickens?"
- "City should establish more public agriculture opportunities and understand that the public is willing to pay for these services/opportunities through taxes"
- "Burning agricultural waste is a necessity for farmers. It is the best way to get rid of pests/disease"
- "Neighbouring properties who appear to have home-based auto repair businesses taking over and expanding these businesses and agricultural land being flushed out"
- "Ajax Mine is going to take over acres of farmland"
- "Value-added opportunities such as agri-tourism might be appropriate on some agricultural properties so long as farming is the primary source of income and they are of appropriate size and scale. They should not be a nuisance to the neighbourhood or take away from the intent of agricultural land"
- "There needs to be more support in schools for young people from a farming background
- I feel local farmers are not advertised adequately"
- More groups like the Thompson Shuswap Chef Group (Farm2Chefs)"
- "Really appreciate the maps presented and the perspective of the scale of agriculture in Kamloops"
- "The AAP is a noble task but there are a lot of burnt bridges and faith lost in the City and KXA"
- "Disappointing the TNRD is not getting on board"
- "Barriere has the bull sale, winter fair etc. It has been embraced there. The answer is not to recreate these events in Kamloops"
- "The ALR mapping was done in the 1970s. There are a lot of inaccuracies"
- "The ALR lacks public input and does not take into account the conflict between dairy farmers and developers"
- "What about greenhouse development?"
- "Biggest issue to dairy farming is encroachment due to residential development"
- "Farm tour was eye opening. Didn't realize the need for an AAP prior to the tour"
- "Roadshow presentation is great to have in a private setting to discuss issues as a small group"
- "Historical timeline is an interesting idea"
- "Is there Tk'emlups te Secwepemc land available for farm leasing?"
- "Considering climate change, will we have enough water?"
- "Should the City be snatching abandoned school properties for farmland?"
- "Get agrologists to show farmers how to properly irrigate"
- "Why can't we grow tomatoes!"
- "Medical marihuana should be grown on soil to help subsidize farming"
- "Would like to support local agriculture but can't always afford to given the cost involved"
- "We have built on all of the good farmland. How/where do we grow food?"
- "City loses credibility when they allow prime agricultural land to be developed"
- "Small farms need supplementary income to be able to make it"
- "The future of the Noble Creek irrigation system needs to be dealt with"



- "Buffers for conflicting uses should be a requirement of the developer on his/her property – not the existing farmer"
- "Slaughter remains get shipped to Alberta at a cost"
- "Any talk of having more slaughtering houses or waste removal options?"

# **Exit Survey Results**

Surveys Completed: 77


The purpose of the AAP Roadshow Exit Survey was to provide an opportunity for roadshow participants to write down their comments relative to the AAP process, issues, and potential solutions as well as provide feedback on the value of the roadshow presentation format.

The following is a breakdown of the results of the exit survey. 33 of the 77 survey respondents signed up to be included in the stakeholder email group. To view all comments associated with the survey, please refer to Appendix 6.

#### Survey Respondents Place of Residence:

As apparent from the bar graph (right), the majority of survey respondents were from Sahali and Aberdeen. There was also a large percentage of respondents that chose the "other" category to describe their place of residence. These individuals came from the following locations:

- Tk'emlúps te Secwépemc land






#### Respondent Level of Awareness of AAP Process and Understanding of Material Presented:

Respondents were asked to comment on their awareness of the development of a City of Kamloops AAP prior to the roadshow presentation. More than half of respondents indicated that they were aware of the AAP development prior to the roadshow presentation.

In addition to many respondents being aware of the AAP process, 99% of respondents indicated that they understood the roadshow information presented.



#### Comments included:

- "It is nice to know this is being considered, especially since there is an awesome history of agriculture"
- "The information was comprehensive and well presented"
- "No real direction o the meeting most areas covered were in general terms"
- "Well presented"
- "Some confusion on overlapping jurisdictions i.e. which rules take precedence, ALC or City?"
- "Not really sure of the end plan. Is this another waste of tax payer's money?"
- "It is far too late for preservation (30 years). Prime land has been developed. Dictator approach to area's now deemed 'Agriculture'"
- "not at the presentation"
- "Presenter was knowledgeable and very clear. Easy to understand"
- "Great info, school integration would be wonderful. Will contact for Ag. plan info"
- "This was a very interesting presentation. We need more support for all types of gardening and farming practices"
- "Excellent presentation- very informative"
- "Excellent presentation Maren"
- "Too much printing on overheads. Can't read it at all. Pictures and graphs would be better"
- "Though there is a lot to digest"
- "Very good plan, definitely an area that needs policy development regarding current Ag. Issues"
- "visually appealing (graphically easy to understand)"
- "Very well communicated. Tough policies and procedures broken down nicely"
- "I feel like it is put together very well and that it is an exceptional presentation"
- "Good Presentation"
- "Super Clear"



- "Excellent presentation. Surprised at some stats (especially water licences) that shows 198 for all Kamloops"
- "but if talking about sustainability the information should be more related to enrich our soils instead been depleted with toxics and herbicides"
- "good information. Thank you. Glad it is being considered by our City"

## Comments on Other Information to Consider for the AAP:

While 91% of respondents felt much more informed about the AAP development subsequent to the

roadshow presentation, the following comments were also noted as far as other information that they would like to receive:

- "How to address Urban Agriculture and management of livestock etc. i.e. Chickens"
- "I'd like the city to model how and when to water. They city creates rivers on asphalt during the day in the heat"

"I'd like the city to model how and when to water. The city creates rivers on asphalt during the day in the heat"

- "Not enough information given on future zone changes and development of land"
- "All work is very positive for Agriculture to coincide with local developments. Public education on how local farms incorporate to the community. General views- presentation was very well put together. Excellent job"
- "Where local products can be purchased"
- "It is easy to fix this problem, but it will not be addressed in a serious way"
- "I feel there is another agenda below the surface"
- "Plans to preserve pollinators like bees Pesticide use Need for natural areas to preserve abundant and useful native food and medicine species like Saskatoon, onion and Mullen"
- "The city needs to commit to protecting agricultural land from industry and increase their support for the people in the food producing sector"
- "I would like to hear more about the negative effects from Ajax"
- "If the city buys land for parks, why don't they buy land for Agriculture?"
- "More on how to tap into funding to start up the land you wish to farm"
- "Geothermal/solar energy to assist local farming community to reduce growing costs-green energy"
- "I'd like to know about opportunities and limitations (regulations, permits) for small plot urban farmers."
- "I would like more specifics, but I realize that you cannot do that yet"



- "Some were a little vague. What they mean by 'support' and 'encourage; in the mission statement. How does one measure/quantify those terms?"
- "Organic farming, pesticide free zone"

#### Respondents' Familiarity with Local Agricultural Issues:

38% of respondents felt that they were aware of other issues facing local agriculture that were not presented during the roadshow presentation, while 36% of respondents replied that they that did not know of any other issues. Some of the other issues identified included those listed below. Of all of those listed, the most popular responses included: Ajax Mine, water, land, GMOs, pesticides, and urban agriculture.

- "Too much diversification e.g. Agri-tourism. Add value industry. Water issues (cost), sustainability of water by the city"
- "I am curious to fruit growing opportunities and keeping growth local and affordable
- Urban Agriculture"
- "Noble Creek irrigation system, Additional tax rate (mill rate) for large parcels of land allowed to lie follow (thus not qualify for farm status) to let current older owners remain on their property"
- "Water"
- "soil, water and air contamination for residents in Kamloops who want to grow their own food"
- "What about the Singh St. Bridge, the various Kamplans, CPR yard "covered like Calgary" BC Mine Tenure Act update"
- "The Ajax mine and how it is going to pollute the agricultural area around it."
- "Everything is covered under major headings, but issues are detailed and need to be dealt with at detailed level"
- "TNRD does not have an AAC. It is a credit to Kamloops City"
- "Ag. facilities for convention fairs, shows etc. to promote public awareness"
- "water licence/abuse, availability"
- "crop insurance. greenhouses on ALR instead of non Ag. Land"
- "boat wake erosion on farm lands and GMO invasive plants, limited water supply from streams at winter and summer low flow may be exasperated by city assisting with folks getting off city water. apply for provincial licence. impacts fish"
- "leasing land, where is the most fertile land"
- "increase ability for year round hot house growing in order to compete with American big box producers"
- "Tranquille on the Lake-working farm educational facility development"
- "provide incentives to buying locally produced food"
- "Water issues we talked about"



  urban agriculture is in the Social Plan's jurisdiction but I hope there is a strong linkage as I
  see the issues as intertwined."
- "High seasonal work turnovers"
- "Desertification/degradation of land, how to improve nutrient quality, reduce pesticide/poison leaching. Also dual or triple piping for drinking water, gray water, organic waste in order to reduce purification lost, recycle waste water heat/nutrients"
- "Many issues have been discussed in committee. I'm not sure they need to be addressed or should be addressed in the plan. i.e. taxes on farm buildings etc."
- "GE test trials. Use of GMO commercial crops"
- "The use of pesticides, herbicides and other toxic chemicals. What about the contamination of GMO (GE) crops and the impact with the bees"
- "water availability"
- "organic certification and other environmentally sustainable practices-how do we protect water sources. Pollinators should be addressed. GMO's- do we want to allow them? become a GMO free zone?"
- "more provisions for urban farmers"

## Respondent Acceptance of Issue Prioritization:

Respondents were asked if they agreed with the way the AAC ranked the issues in order of priority. It was important to note in this question that issues were ranked based on their ability to be dealt

with from a municipal perspective. The compilation of local agricultural issues was extensive, but not all fell within the City's mandate and would likely require commitment from the industry itself and/or more senior levels of government. While most individuals understood that there were certain issues that could be dealt with through the AAP, there were others that may not have understood this fully, identifying some of the other industry issues as high priorities when in reality, they likely could not be dealt with at the municipal government level. 65% of respondents did agree with the AAC's issue prioritization.





Respondents were asked to identify other agricultural sector issues that are of importance to them that may not have been prioritized by the AAC. Comments to this effect included the following:

- "Bylaws definitely need to be changed regarding additional businesses operated on farm land i.e. mechanical, agri tourism, secondary residences. Make it more likely that farmers will stay on their land"
- "Abuse of tax system re: secondary income/businesses, multiple housing using farm tax base"
- "The proposed Ajax mine has enormous potential to contaminate our soil through toxic dust settling on gardens. It should be top priority!"
- "in my opinion, security of land and water should be high on the list of municipal priorities, even if the city has limited control over agricultural lands. It demonstrates vision, realization of risks of loss, and philosophical bias. Given the very real threat to land, water, and air pollution posed by the Ajax mine proposal, and knowing that there are other proposals on the sideline "growth of mining industry" should be a priority. The impact that the Ajax mine will have on the southwest region in particular, but ultimately on the entire area from an agricultural standpoint, is immense."
- "Included with maintaining a healthy ecosystem within our city boundaries, we should be liaising with our neighbouring districts and cities to ensure abundant clean water supplies upstream and downstream and air as free as possible from particulate matter, metals, acids, and other 'dust' components that not only settle on crops, but also contaminate the soil beneath them."
- "Mining and meat processing should have higher priority...I want to be able to buy locally
  grown and processed meat. Mining growth would take huge pieces of land out of the ALR far
  faster than urban growth, though we should pay attention to both areas"
- "Urban sprawl along river"
- "The issues seem rather vague, and/or somewhat overlapping, e.g. does "No municipally designated agricultural support" actually mean "Provide municipally designated agricultural support"? Neither "Aging farmers" nor ""Education and support for new farmers" are prioritized -- this seems to be one of the most important issues. While "Environmental sustainability" is prioritized, what does it mean? This is where I believe that the City should be encouraging organic farming specifically and restricting the use of GMOs. Improving the urban agriculture interface" is prioritized, but have there actually been many cases of incidents between farmers and nearby residents? My choices for prioritizing would be Security of land and water -- prioritizing this would cover both "Zoning and by-laws" and "Population growth versus agricultural land preservation" Support for new farmers (not so much education as making land available) "Growth of mining industry" -- a concern both from the point of view of contamination of land and water outside the mine area, and of actual use of land that was former ranch land. The AAP could strongly advise against mining in close proximity to agricultural (and small garden) land--this would be another encouragement for City Council to speak against encouraging the mining industry to locate near the City"
- "loss of ranch properties to multiple sites is more major than it seems. Sites need to work with ALR on this one if land is to be kept in real production. Why sell a 1/4 section to fund



farming losses thus changing productive capacity, when 5 acres or less would bring similar revenue. The solution is easy but counter-intuitive"

- "Perhaps a joint AAC would improve understanding"
- "New urban farmer support"
- "urban agriculture. backyard gardening support- water cost, chickens in the city, bee keeping"
- "Include more emphasis on education and support for new farmers/food producers"
- "there are many ways the city could promote local food production and also modelling proper watering"
- "water issues is there a second or third source of water as the current system in the lowest point of the river"
- "Disappearing agricultural land used for developing residential areas"
- "I am not a farmer or knowledgeable about what issues farmers face which are within domain of municipality"
- "Industrial Agriculture is a zoning problem"
- "We live in a desert. Water and its value cannot be over explained"
- "Bylaws are important, but sustainability, human health and land stewardship should trump as priorities"
- "go 100% organic (no GMO, no pesticides, no herbicides)"
- "love the fact you are looking at corporate purchase policies and urban agriculture interface, more support to farmers"
- "In general yes, but I was surprised that nothing under industry diversification was prioritized"
- "many people interested in supporting Urban Ag will leave Kamloops if Ajax mine is approved"

"The Noble Creek Irrigation System is invaluable to the residents of this area. Many residents have hay farms or like us commercial vegetable farms and rely entirely on this system to irrigate our crops during the summer. It would be astronomically expensive to use city water for this as we have almost 10 acres under production and even though we have mainly a drip system we still irrigate overhead in some areas. In addition it would be a huge waste of resources to use city water to water this amount of land.


Our farm is our livelihood, so to not have this system would impact us immensely financially."



# Open Houses: The Draft AAP

Each open house was 90 minutes in length, and were hosted at four different venues in the City throughout the month of October 2013. The purpose of the open houses was to provide the public with an opportunity to review and comment on the draft AAP. Staff were on hand to answer questions and AAC members attended some of the events in order to do the same.

Four venues were chosen in order to make this stage of public consultation convenient for individuals interested in participating. An exit survey was available to attendees and comment sheets were also completed by people reviewing the proposed strategies and actions for the AAP. Attendees also had the opportunity to agree or disagree with draft strategies and actions by sticking a green or red dot on any of the proposed action items.



The open houses were advertised in the local media, through the stakeholder email group, on the AAP Facebook page, and on the AAP website. The open houses were drop-in events.

For those not able to attend an open house, documents available at the events were posted at www.kamloops.ca/environment/land-publicparticipation.shtml. This provided an opportunity for people to view the draft plan and comment via email. Hard copies of the draft were also made available for distribution.

The open house advertisement is included as Appendix 8.

#### We Listened and We Heard

The open houses were not well attended in comparison to previous stages of public consultation geared to the AAP. That being said, the overall feedback received from the open houses was constructive and supportive of the plan. The future of the Rayleigh Tournament Capital Ranch was a common theme, as well as the development of a farm business incubator program to support new farmers. Some participants felt that there needed to be specific language implemented into some of the action items that would ensure that trespassing and weed control issues were dealt with during the implementation phase of the plan (i.e. detailed policy development). Other participants felt that the absence of action items related to the City taking a stance on mining or GMOs (genetically modified organisms) was disappointing.

The following is a randomized list of comments and notes recorded from the open houses:

- "What if we had a networking contact sheet to put us in contact with other potential farmers/workers?"
- "Thanks for putting this on"
- "Am wondering where an eco-village could be located in Kamloops area that would not be within the pollution range of any potential mine"
- "Have we considered joining up with the international transition town movement to help support our Sustainable Kamloops initiatives?"
- "I am interested possibility signing up for the incubator farm"
- "Review the possibility of working with Heffley Creek Town District to replace irrigation ditch running through Heffley Creek with an underground PVC pipe"
- "Mining: Return to pre-extraction state or better so that the crops are safe to eat, that the animals that eat the re-growth are safe to eat, that the fish in the streams or lakes are safe to eat"
- "Spell out what acronyms mean e.g AGRI"
- "How can there be a 'local' grocery chain?"
- "Local grocery chain- re-word for grocers to better support local farmers/products"
- "Good posters"
- "I see 'economically viable' written often as though this is more important than 'ecologically or sustainable viable'"
- "The ideas for local produce store is awesome!"
- "Publically/ cooperatively run would make a 'local' grocery chain even better (Coopers doesn't count)"
- "I dig the cookies. But what if we had some locally grown food to get people in the door too?"
- "Strategy #6- please make sure that the Ord Rd Federal Ag. Research stations is never sold to a GE/GMO agriculture testing company"



- "Recommend action 36- Can you provide more/different examples of incompatible land uses next to ALR land? Some industries wouldn't be appropriate next to farms, some vegetable farms would make the perfect neighbours for a school or residential area- it would be hard to generally have a policy excluding the adjacent uses"
- "Recommend Action 54- public produce. The 'description' for this action focuses on celebrations of food/harvest, which is different from specifically supporting public produce through grants or land. If the intention is to support public produce through grants, land, staff time etc, it would be great to state that explicitly"
- "Goals section- #1- contains guiding principles, I know that the GE topic is very contentious, however, I would like to see a guiding principle that addresses, if not GMO's themselves, at least a consideration for natural services that have real economic value to farming: clean air, clean water and pollinators especially. I think it would make everyone feel like their concerns were more addressed if these important services were at least referred to as being valued. It could tie into Action 30- Assessing impact on natural services could be a part of the Agricultural Impact Assessment. It could also tie into Action 61- and be included in the best environmental management practices information. Water is addressed very well in this plan, so it would be great to see the other equally important natural services also included. It could be for goal 6"
- "Thank you for the broad, visionary and in-touch plan. I'm sure it wasn't easy to reconcile so many points of view and interests, but this is very good"
- "Include an action point regarding specific support for organic farms (with reference to Strategy 5- environmentally beneficial guidelines)"
- "Organic/small scale/diversified farms should be mentioned with regards to the reduction of fossil fuels and greenhouse gas emissions"
- "I specifically support a local (independently owned or cooperative grocery store- regarding Strategy 5)"
- "Strategy 3- need an action to encourage development of processing facilities/infrastructures with industry and other producers- possible 'RPP' that leads to economic opportunities"
- "Strategy 1- review city landscapes- more edible urban agriculture"
- "City hall- grow edible as in 2012 and 2013 lead by example"
- "Yes to encourage senior government to pursue economic policies and buy local"
- "Great idea incubator Farm and Kitchen to develop food economy"
- "Public procedure in Parks/city owned property"
- "Urban Agriculture plan needed as well"
- "Tie in schools/farm to plate"
- "I'm looking for organic e.g. pesticide free farms, orchards"
- "Lobby for change 'Right to Farm Act' to look after my need for healthy foods- pesticide free and local"
- "Concern about knapweed control within City on both city land and private land. Nothing done which is contrary to Provincial legislation"
- "Strategy 2- I don't understand why residential/schools would not be compatible with ALR lands"
- "Strategy 5- I was unclear of how local food grocery chains would be recruited from wouldn't it be more sustainable to normalize distribution through established stores?"



- "Weed control- use to have government program, now we don't since amalgamation within City limits"
- "Trespassing is a huge problem on our range land e.g. Campbell Creek trail system- new use - people hiking and not respecting that it is Crown grazing land- dogs loose, gates left open etc. We have learned to live with it but it would be nice if there was more consideration/education"
- "How to find someone to lease my farmland- too much to manage now but I want it to remain in production. I also want to ensure all the hard work I've put into it over the years isn't reversed by someone coming in who doesn't necessarily know what they are doing"

The following is a randomized list of email comments received during the Open house stage:

- "Protecting all the agricultural land in the City will be of no use if we don't have people to
  work the land and if we don't educate the public on the importance of local agriculture.
  From what I've seen, agricultural land has ended up in developers hands because our
  farmers/ranchers could not make a viable go at their respective ventures"
- "We need to provide programmes and mentorships to bring in new farmers, allow existing
  farmers to diversify their activities so that they complement their farming practices with
  education etc. We need our local governments to adopt policies that support the use of local
  agricultural product within their institutions, plus provide real tangible incentives for our
  farming community"
- "Page 58 Action #41 which is to 'Encourage senior levels of government to consider the establishment of an agricultural enhancement fund..." It's the readers interpretation of this action item that needs clarification to myself and perhaps others. When and where would this action item by used, perhaps some examples are needed. In my view, it opens the floodgates for applications for ALR removal and increases uncertainty for agriculture..."
- "Some lands will be in the direct path of future urban development. How do we deal with these properties?"
- "I am totally in favour of small growers. Including small marijuana growers. I am totally against factory farms, including commercial grow-ops."
- Suggestion for discussion of policy development during implementation of AAP:
  - "Non-agricultural developments will be considered:
    - On lands not in the ALR (after ALR lines affirmed). This includes a review of all private lands, provincially held Crown lands and Parks. (non-agricultural developments allowed subject to zoning)
    - ALR lands with minimal potential (ie. No irrigation source/potential, typically those isolated lands with minimal range values, lower biodiversity values, other management issues such as adjacency to urban areas, trespass issues, heavy weed infestations etc.). (non-agricultural developments will be considered)
    - ALR lands that are being used for range purposes but may not be of critical importance for range use, non-irrigated with no potential water source (nonagricultural applications will be considered)



- On the categories below, applications for ALR removal for non-agricultural development will not be considered. Agriculture is recognized as the priority industry:
  - ALR lands, non-prime, with good range values/potential. May currently be dryland farmed with/without an irrigation source.
  - ALR lands that are being irrigated, non prime lands.
  - 3. All other agricultural lands in the ALR."
- "The first goal: promote agriculture as a sustainable industry". There is absolutely nothing sustainable about agriculture that poisons our naturally occurring environmental services such as pollinators, water, air, soil life and seeds"
- "GE-Free Kamloops wants to see policy on GMO/GE crops in the Agriculture Area Plan"
- "Does the City of Kamloops think it is immune to the loss of pollinators?"

# **Interactive Opportunity**

Participants of the open houses were asked to stick green or red stickers on the action items that they agreed or disagreed with and also put stickers on the posters containing the AAP's vision and mission statements. A green sticker meant the participant agreed with the action item it pertained to and a red sticker indicated disagreement. # Exit Survey Results

#### Surveys Completed: 21

The purpose of the AAP open house exit survey was to provide an opportunity for participants to record their comments relative to the draft AAP and provide feedback on the value of the open house format.


The following is a breakdown of the results of the exit survey. To view all comments associated with the survey, please refer to Appendix 9.

#### Survey Respondents' Places of Residence:

As apparent from the bar graph (right), the majority of survey respondents were from Heffley Creek, Rayleigh, and Sahali. This may have been in part due to the locations of the open houses.

#### How Respondents Found out about the Event and Their Feelings on the Information Presented:

Open houses were advertised through a number of channels. According to those that completed an exit survey, the local newspapers were a common source of awareness of the open house events. The website and "word of mouth" were also identified as the means by which participants found out about the events. While not apparent through the survey, in conversations at the open houses, a few people indicated that they found out about the events via the radio.



More than 60% of respondents indicated that they were aware of the AAP process prior to the open houses. There were also some participants that were new to the process and provided input for the first time.

All of the survey respondents indicated that they understood the information presented at the open houses, while more than 85% indicated that staff were adequately able to answer any questions they had. Typically, those that did not feel their questions were adequately answered were those that felt that the AAP should take a stance related to the proposed Ajax Mine.

While almost half of the respondents felt that the draft strategies and actions presented were adequate in building a better support system for the agriculture industry, many were also unsure. As a result of the open houses, staff believe that clarification and a better understanding of the long-range planning process may have been needed. Some participants needed an explanation as to how the proposed action items would be implemented and some had not had an opportunity to review the full draft AAP prior to attending an open house. It was reinforced to participants that



while many of the action items are merely statements in the draft plan at this time, once the AAP is adopted by City Council, implementation of each action item would begin and there would be a separate planning process, and in many cases, public consultation would be involved in the development of each one.

Comments associated with this survey question included the following:

- "Public awareness of agriculture and ALR is well covered, assistance to new farmers and irrigation potential, but little on the marketing of the product"
- "A step in the right direction. Economics of agriculture is still difficult to address with land so expensive within the city and southern BC"
- "Many are although some seem bureaucratic and possibly 'prescriptive'?"
- "I think there should be more explicit statements about supporting local organic farmers. The basis of the plan would also be better established in the support and growth of the Kamloops Regional Farmers Market"
- "Really need urban agriculture plan"
- "The ALC should be pushing for keeping our land safe to grow crops by getting the Mineral Tenure Act improved"
- "I don't really know enough about it"
- "A beginning but I was expecting something more definitive"
- "a good beginning"
- "Many if not most are. But instead of focusing so much on current agricultural practices & economic viability, we should be focusing on sustainable agriculture.
   Urban Farming/organically grown etc."



"Is the KXA site still active? Will there be a public meeting about the development of an Ag. facility at the TCR? I am most interested in the development of the southend of the TCR as an equestrian facility, riding ring, agri-multi-plex, roping etc. I would to see an equine gate so that we could have easier access to ride here. # Suggestions, Comments and Other Ideas for Actions Items for the AAP:

Participants were asked if they would like to share any other suggestions, comments or ideas for actions items to consider for the AAP. The following is a list of some of the written comments received:



- "Yes, as (6) above- the marketing of product- The Farmers Market- are important but rather than one store dedicated to local, as in one strategy, to normalize local distribution as well as to external markets"
- "pollinators, local food security"
- "Greywater recovery systems so clean water is used for crops, not washing cars and cisterns for preserving rainfall"
- "Thank you for including urban agriculture"
- "Planning for the development of the lands attached to the TCR (Tournament Capital Ranch)"
- "Ensure bylaws & bylaw enforcement understands agriculture and are practical"
- "Is the KXA site still active? Will there be a public meeting about the development of an Ag. facility at the TCR? I am most interested in the development of the southend of the TCR as an equestrian facility, riding ring, agri-multi-plex, roping etc. I would to see an equine gate so that we could have easier access to ride here. A lot of us walk dogs here and cross country ski. It would be good to see more locals using the property, although it is getting more use lately."
- "More incentives for urban farming. We need a publically run education centre pioneering sustainable practices in the Secwpemc region"
- "I'm impressed by the extent of work already in the plan. I appreciate the staff explaining
  that there's a separate local food security plan to address more or less commercial food
  growth. That gives me a fuller picture of where the AAP fits in the larger food security
  picture. Thank you"
- "Would have been worthwhile for some committee members to be present"
- "Do not destroy what you can never reclaim. Thank you for letting us have a look at your suggestions"
- "Yes, please add a provision banning GE/GMO food production as it is not healthy, sustainable or local"
- "Could you please change the comment #58 on page 62 that needs 'support the
  development of fact sheets for farmers and the community that answer difficult questions
  (e.g. genetically modified organisms (GMO) vs (GE).....' perhaps the workding could be;
  '...answer difficult questions such as whether GE/GMOs are safe for sustainable farming and
  human consumption'"
- "Please get the science data as it is better to use properly our land than to try to clean it up later. Where has this reclamation worked?"
- "Most of the Ag land in Kamloops is already taken up by residential buildings. It is important
  to encourage 'growing your own food' as well by reconsidering landscaping standards,
  allowing chickens, bees etc. in backyards and supporting and promoting community
  gardens."
- "what is happening to the 'abandoned' equestrian & rodeo equipment rotting at the TCR site?"
- "is there a plan for an equestrian park at the TCR? If so, when? where? how?
- "use land at TCR for agricultural uses"

# Exit Survey Feedback from the Event - 37 people completed the exit survey

## The Positives:

- 100% of respondents indicated the tour was valuable to them and their respective agencies.
- Majority of respondents saw opportunities for industry expansion and diversification in Kamloops.
- Majority of respondents indicated that their agency could play a particular role in assisting to resolve some of the industry issues discussed on the tour.
  - Many felt this tour hosted by the City was a long time coming and were pleased with the opportunity to talk about local agriculture.
- Range of knowledge levels in terms of the local agriculture industry. Many indicated they were somewhat familiar with local agriculture. Majority of respondents indicated that they were more familiar with local agriculture after the tour.
  - 97.1% of respondents indicated a need to protect the resources (i.e. land and water, management skills, and people) that are important to sustain the local agriculture industry or expand it.



- Many commented that the tour was an excellent opportunity to network and discuss the issues and important in terms of listening to farmers and hearing the challenges they face with local government.
- Producers opening up their properties for tours were very pleased with the turnout and the opportunity to speak about their operations as well as issues and challenges.
- Good range of farms representing different sectors visited.

  - More time needed on each farm.
- It was difficult to hear conversations in the back of the bus.
- More City Councillors should have attended.
- More actual tours like the one at Blackwell




# Some of the issues from producers included:

- Property access issues, neighbour-to-neigbour issues (e.g. dust from farm machinery and weeds).
- Water. Without irrigation, we could not grow anything here.
  - Aging farmers:
- No one to buy their land and keep as farmland;
- Pressure to develop; and
- Need to research creative ways to allow farmers to retire gracefully, but ensure their agricultural land, if good for agricultural purposes, remains in production.
  - Getting people to buy/appreciate local products.
- Backwards distribution system (i.e. beef to Alberta and labelled as Alberta beef, but most likely BC raised and potatoes shipped to Vancouver for distribution and then back to Kamloops into the stores).
- Kamloops Farmers' Market a lot of people attending, but not a lot of purchasing.
  - City of Kamloops and other institutions need to lead by example. Agreement on Internal Trade (AIT) makes it difficult for BC municipalities to develop local procurement policies but it can be done.







- Lack of skilled professionals to support local agriculture industry.
- Regulations should be different for farms:
- More flexible (i.e. housing for workers and second dwellings, agri tourism and other businesses that help the farm survive).
   More opportunities for value-added
- More opportunities for value-added products so that we can run a year round farmers' market, but no central processing, cold storage, or distribution facilities.
  - Lack of awareness/education among the public regarding benefits of buying local and people are comfortable purchasing in the grocery stores because it is more affordable and convenient.
- Protect Agricultural Land Reserve (ALR) lands, but ensure they are brought into productivity (there needs to be a balance). Support new farmers by connecting new farmers with land.





### Kamloops releases Public Input Report on local agriculture

Kamloops, B.C. - The results of a public survey conducted earlier this year aimed at Kamloops residents, food retailers and producers are now available in the form of a Public Input Report.

Recognizing the importance of gaining preliminary input from the people of Kamloops toward the development of a City of Kamloops Agriculture Area Plan, City staff, with the support of the Agriculture Advisory Committee, polled the public to solicit feedback on local agriculture issues, successes and food buying patterns.

The overall goal of the Agriculture Area Plan is to build strong, positive relationships between the City, local agricultural community and the Agricultural Land Commission in order to work toward sustainability and promotion of local agriculture.

"The local producer survey response rate was overwhelming," said Maren Luciani, staff lead for the development of the Agriculture Area Plan. "Not only do the responses point to several key issues and challenges faced by producers, but the survey responses more generally suggest that agriculture planning is overdue and an issue the people of Kamloops are passionate about."

82 local producers, 298 consumers and 31 retailers completed the targeted surveys bringing the total to 411 surveys. The Agriculture Advisory Committee, City staff and consultants will be able to use the information collected from the surveys to support policy and program development pertaining to agriculture, both at the local level and with senior levels of government. The report can be used to support local producers and retailers in determining needs and demands for future marketing initiatives and to provide direction on future research required to meet public demand.

According to Randy Lambright, Planning & Development Manager for the City, some of the more common themes extracted from the surveys which will be considered as potential policies for the Agriculture Area Plan include: the potential need for a centralized, year-round, diversified farmers market facility that includes local processing, cold storage and distribution capacity; local programming and business planning for new farmers; the need for a farm bylaw that supports local farming; more flexibility of use of land within the ALR; educational programming and marketing for local food; and the potential for a permanent City of Kamloops Agriculture Advisory Committee.

The Public Input Report is <u>available online</u> and in hard copy. A Public Consultation Plan is in the works to identify further opportunities for public input and feedback as the planning process moves forward. All future opportunities for public input will be posted on the City □s website and printed in the local papers.



### Agriculture Farm Tour builds awareness of local farming

**Kamloops**, **BC** – On Thursday, September 13<sup>th</sup>, the Kamloops Agriculture Advisory Committee hosted a Kamloops Farm Tour in order to facilitate a better understanding of the local commercial agriculture industry in order to help guide the development of a City Agriculture Area Plan. This community engagement event is one of several more to come that will be included as part of Agriculture Area Plan Development Process.

The tour, of approximately 60 people representing various agencies including, but not limited to, Interior Health, the First Nations Agricultural Association, the Ministry of Agriculture, Venture Kamloops, Community Futures, TNRD, City staff and Council, Thompson Rivers University and Agri-Foods and Olympic Legacies, aimed to educate participants on the challenges and opportunities of local commercial farming operations, trends of the industry, and the successes and failures of different sectors of Kamloops agriculture. The tour included presentations by Dhaliwal Green Acres Vegetable Farm, Thistle Farm, Frolek Cattle Company and Blackwell Dairy. Lunch was provided by Terra Restaurant, a Kamloops eatery that uses locally or regionally grown products as available, funded by Community Futures Thompson Country.




1: The farm tour stopped at Dhaliwal Green Acre Vegetable Farm, the largest onion producer in BC and one of the largest potato producers in BC.

Gary Rolston, Professional Agrologist, of 'From the Ground Up' in Courtenay noted that, according to a model developed by the BC Ministry of Agriculture, it takes 0.524 hectares to feed one person, of which 10% must be irrigated. "Kamloops needs close to 45,000 hectares of land to be fully food self-sufficient. There isn't that much land available within the boundaries of the City. This is why Kamloops should be looking to support and encourage agricultural development in the larger region."

In addition, the average age of BC farmers continues to climb, and without new generations stepping in to take over, this poses a very real threat to local farming enterprises. More and more produce is transported from the US and Mexico. While farmers markets provide a great opportunity to source local products and raise awareness about local food, the distribution and wholesale processes in the province leave costly inefficiencies. "We need to be able to sell our produce in local stores. Local produce is shipped to large central warehouses at the coast and then shipped back to the large stores in Kamloops", said one local farmer. The first step to dealing with these issues is awareness, and the tour helped to generate this, as well as potential future partnerships for local agricultural support.

Participants left the tour with a better understanding of the industry, and recognized the need to protect the area's resources, such as land and water, and to sustain and expand the local agriculture industry.

"Although we will always have to bring In food from around the world, local food supplies provide the consumer a healthy "ripened-on-the-vine" alternative," said Jeremy Cooke, of AC Eagle Enterprises, a local consulting firm.

"This tour helped us to raise awareness and educate people about local food sustainability issues, which will be reflected in our Agriculture Area Plan process as we move forward", said City Planner,

Maren Luciani. "We are hearing loud and clear that there needs to be more flexibility in terms of regulations for bonafide farmers and a better municipal support system for the industry. This tour not only helped to flush out the issues facing farmers but also generate discussion surrounding some of the potential solutions to these issues."

"We can easily transition some of our agricultural lands back into horticultural production. We have the soil and climate to grow food crops instead of just hay," stated Robson Rogan, Professional Agrologist for Purity Feeds, a local agricultural supply company that caters to both local and regional farmers.

Councillor Nelly Dever concluded, "We need to build partnerships between the City and the agricultural community in order to help mitigate the challenges facing the industry."

All feedback will be compiled, reviewed and considered in the development of the agriculture area plan.

"We're soliciting input for the plan. This one is to look at issues that have been compiled from surveys we sent out in 2012 from a farm tour with local officials and producers, and conversations with the agricultural advisory committee," said Luciani.

There will be another public consultation phase for potential strategies and actions for the plan in early summer 2013. The plan is anticipated to go to Council for adoption later this fall.

### New farming options considered for agricultural plan

A partnership between new and old farmers is just one facet of the City's agriculture area plan, regional directors learned.

City planner Maren Luciani provided an update on the plan to the Thompson-Nicola Regional District board Thursday afternoon.

The plan looks at ways to improve the community's support for the agricultural industry, which has waned during the last two or three decades, she said.

"This has been identified as a high-priority through the Sustainable Kamloops Plan," Luciani told regional directors. "Additionally, we want to ensure that land is preserved and brought into productivity for agriculture and, more importantly, for food."

An aspect the regional district can become involved in is creating leasing opportunities for farmers, she said. Farmers across Canada are aging, and new farmers aren't coming up the chain to replace them. Luciani would like to see a partnership where new farmers, who often can't afford to buy a big plot of land, are

connected to existing farm properties that aren't being used.

She said farmers on the verge of retirement might also be convinced to rent out a portion of their land to a new farmer.

"Whether it be a whole chunk or, in theory, dividing it up into pieces and having a new farmer come in to utilize the land," she said after the presentation.

"Twenty years from now, if we're not growing new farmers, who is going to grow our food?"

An open house will take place some time in July or August, with residents from rural communities invited to learn more about the plan. Luciani said the dates will be advertised and reported in the media.

The plan will be presented to City council early in the fall, she said.

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





## SECTION 4: STRATEGIES AND ACTIONS

Several strategies have been identified through extensive public consultation and technical review to achieve the AAP goals. They are identified and described in this section. Each of the strategies contains a number of policy recommendations that can be implemented over time to create support for and consideration of the needs of the local agricultural industry. The AAP includes a number of actions for achieving the goals identified earlier for the preservation, growth, and diversification of the local agricultural sector. Strategies and actions were developed based on public feedback from surveys; the farm tour; developed by other BC communities. The next section describes these actions, implementation timelines, and the party(ies) road show presentations and an open house; input from the AAC, the stakeholder group and City staff; and review of plans responsible for implementing each one. Each action has been assigned a priority level depending on the ease of which it can be implemented, its associated cost as well as the length of time required to implement the action. Priority levels are identified as:

- Low priority (implementation is difficult, costly, and lengthy, 10+ years).
- Medium priority (implementation can be done with a low level of difficulty, with some financial implications, within ten years) Σ
- High priority (implementation can be done with ease, with minimal financial implications, within five years). I
- Immediate priority (action item to be included in the 2014 Budget and Corporate Strategic Plan).
